Urgent Purpose In Coronation Gift Fund Appeal

Supporting the Queen Elizabeth II Coronation Trust Fund for Mothers and Children, Dr. Edith Clement said yesterday that the proposed mothercraft centre would fill a great need in Canberra.

Dr. Clement referred to three cases within recent months in which mothers were suddenly taken ill and their babies, under one month old had to be put in homes in Sydney or Melbourne.

Other mothers living in hostels had difficulty in preparing
food for their babies after leaving hospital.


Mothers leaving nospital, particularly with a first child would be able to live in the centre for up to a fortnight to receive instruction in baby care and feeding.

The home would also cater for babies suffering from ailments which required observation and treatment, and premature babies needing special care.

Dr. Clement is hopeful that the home will later become a training centre for mothercraft nurses.

50 YEARS AT A GLANCE

1963 The QEII Coronation Home for post-natal care was opened in Civic.

The Matron was Miss B N Nicholson

1970s Day stay facilities at the QEII home expanded. The Matron's flat was converted to provide increased accommodation.

Staff started logging the number of calls they had been receiving from parents seeking help and advice.

Further delays in the proposed building of the new QEII home in Deakin.

1980s The 24 hour telephone enquiry service was established as part of the services offered at QEII.

The Home's role as a resource and teaching centre for health care professionals continued to expand.

The title "Matron" was changed to "Director of Nursing" in line with current trends.

1990s The new West Wing of QEII Civic opened.

The name "Queen Elizabeth II Home for Mothers and Babies" changed to "Queen Elizabeth Hospital".

Proposals regarding the sale of the QEII site and incorporation of the service into a general hospital service at Acton Peninsula were made and debated.

The combined position of Nursing and Chief Executive Officer was established.

In 1997 the QEII Hospital in Civic closed its doors and the Queen Elizabeth II Family Centre opened for business in Curtin.

The Day Stay program relocated and decentralised and was conducted by three QEII staff seconded to the ACT Government Child, Family and Youth Health Program.

Quality Improvement and Staff Development programs continued.


The title of Director of Nursing was changed to Director of Nursing and

Midwifery / Executive Officer to reflect current trends.

2000s Consolidation of the Primary Health model of care was complemented by the introduction of the research-based C-Frame as the platform for the delivery of care centre in the Curtin facility.

CMS began offering community development programs for grandparents and couples prior to having their babies.

Did you know...



1953-1963

This article includes some excerpts from 'The Mothering Years' by Helen Crisp and Loma Rudduck

Did you know that QEII was a gift to Canberra from Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth the Second? Well the story is a bit more complicated than that...

To set up a post-natal facility had been one of the Canberra Mothercraft Society's unachieved objectives for 24 years. The Society first put a proposal to the Government in 1929 but the reality of Canberra getting the post-natal

hospital the women advocated was a long time coming.

An opportunity came in 1953 with the coronation of Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II and her visit to Australia with the Duke of Edinburgh the following year. It was an exciting time and there would have been few Australians who were not aware of the visit and the excitement that it generated.

Those very determined women of the CMS recognised an opportunity to fill an important need and quickly got to work, using their now well developed lobbying and organisational skills.

To commemorate the coronation of the Queen, an Australia-wide appeal to establish a fund to support appropriate projects had been set up. The ACT's share of this was £2000 and the proposal from the Society was selected to receive the ACT's share of the Queen's Coronation Gift Fund.

It was a great start but there was much planning and negotiating to be done. It took ten years in fact and eventually all was in place. In January 1963 the Queen Elizabeth II Coronation Home for Mothers and Babies in Civic opened.

Fifty years later, the site of QEII and the people who work there have changed, but it remains a key service in the Territory and is much loved and highly respected in the Canberra community and further afield.

As part of QEII's celebrations, current and former CMS members, QEII staff and community members met



with Community Artist Gabriella Hegyes in September 2012. Gabriella had recently been appointed Artist in Residence at the Strathnairn Art Centre for Canberra's centenary year.

In the meetings it was highlighted that QEII Civic and later QEII Curtin has had an important role in the lives of many along with the values that underpin the important work done by the staff and volunteers.

Many of the treasured traditions and stories were identified along with the importance of documenting, recording and archiving them.

Gabriella conducted workshops where stories of QEII's history and connections were shared, many historical items were photographed and multi-media skills were learned and utilised to create some $50^{\rm th}$ Anniversary commemorative items.

As a result of the workshops, CMS commissioned Gabriella to create an artwork, 'Bonnets to Beanies' as part of the QEII 50th Anniversary celebrations.
