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President's Message

This year, the Canberra Mothercraft Society (CMS) has begun to emerge from the shadow of our great achievement, the QEII Family Centre. Since handing back the management of QEII to the ACT Government in 2019, the Board has taken time to reflect on the Society's history and consider future ambitions. It has not been without some effort that the Board has lifted its collective eye to the horizon and charted a forward course.

The Board began the year with a strategic planning session, submitting the status quo to the scrutiny of an external consultant and undertaking a SWOT analysis to identify and assess the strengths, weaknesses, opportunities, and threats to our 95-year-old organisation. From this baseline the Board invited a critical friend's review, then debated and negotiated, polished and refined our way to a place of consensus.

My thanks to the Board for tackling the difficult questions and committing to a plan that will allow CMS to build on the foundations of the past and seed its future influence. I am delighted that the 2021 - 2026 Strategic Plan is published here in this Annual Report.

Over the course of the year, two significant board members were farewelled, including long-serving honorary medical officer, Dr Suzanne Packer AO, and immediate past President, Mrs Viola Kalokerinos. Dr Suzanne Packer AO retired in January 2021 and was presented with CMS Life Membership in recognition of her considerable contribution to CMS and its clients. We are very proud of and grateful for our continuing association with Sue.



Mrs Viola Kalokerinos retired in April 2021 after 12 years of board membership, including serving as President 2014 -17. A farewell ceremony was held for Viola in May. Immediate past Executive Officer of CMS, Mary Kirk AM, attended to share stories of Viola's appointment to the Board, her generosity, business accumen, political and social network, kindness and sense of community. Viola remains a cherished and highly valued member of CMS and one of our greatest supporters.

A major achievement for CMS this year has been our partnership with the Western Sydney University (WSU). Under the newly established Mary Kirk Fellowship, CMS provided funding for a live webinar and academic paper presented by internationally renowned Australian midwife and academic. Professor Hannah Dahlen AM, on the COAG paper: Strategic Directions for Australian Maternity Services. The lecture and expert panel discussion "The good, the bad and the possible" was broadcast live on Wednesday 24th March, with nearly 700 national and international viewers.

As part of the event, the Board hosted an audience of 30 people at the Hyatt Hotel for the live stream, including invited guests Anita Soar, Policy Officer, Chief Nursing and Midwifery Officer Division, Australian Government Department of Health; Frances Rice, Senior Nursing and Midwifery Advisor, Australian Department of Health; Rebekah Bowman, ACT Branch Chair. Australian College of Midwives; Julia Tran and Pip Courtney-Bailey from Women's Health Matters: Professor Deborah Davis, Clinical Chair in Midwifery, University of Canberra and ACT Government Health Directorate: Dr Sally Muggleton, Discipline Lead, Midwifery, University of Canberra; Anita Rodrigues Macias, Senior Policy Advisor, Rural Doctors Association of Australia: Dr Karen Gardner, Senior Research Fellow, Public Service Research Group UNSW Canberra: Dr Sue Packer AM. Paediatrician; Mary Kirk AM and Ellen O'Keefe, Maternal Health Matters.

CMS member Mary Kirk AM featured on the expert panel discussion that

followed the lecture and also consulted on the accompanying paper. The paper has been submitted for peer review by a preeminent journal. Professor Dahlen has since produced a second paper on the themes that were brought out in the panel discussion during the webinar. Once the first paper has been successfully published, Professor Dahlen will undertake to have the second paper peer-reviewed for publishing. We look forward to sharing further progress on both of these papers in the next Annual Report.



This year CMS has also joined a number of like-minded organisations in supporting the WSU Birth Experience Study. The study takes an in-depth look at birth experience in Australia and canvasses ideas to reduce birth trauma. CMS support of the study will continue into the 2021-22 Financial Year, as the study is translated into several languages in order to reach more Australian women. CMS has thrown our promotional support behind the cutting-edge film *BirthTime: the documentary* by Seline Scobie, Jerusha Sutton, Jo Hunter and Zoe Naylor. The film shines a light on the prevalence and impact of medical intervention in maternity services of the "developed" world and aims to be a voice for change. *Birth Time (the movement)* has since been born.

In February 2021, the National Redress Scheme contacted CMS to notify the Board that an application for redress had been linked to CMS. The Scheme, established in response to the Royal Commission into Institutional Responses to Child Sexual Abuse, supports people who have experienced child sexual abuse. CMS fully supports the Scheme, and, over several months, undertook all required steps to join up. However, after final submission of CMS documentation, the Scheme advised the Board that, upon review, the application was found, in fact, not to be linked to CMS, and CMS was therefore no longer required to join the Scheme. At this point, the Board determined - by majority vote – that CMS would not join • the scheme, but would unhesitatingly do so if required to at any stage.

CMS was pleased to support the completion and publicity of the *Right Birth, Your Choice* video by Maternal Health Matters. The video informs women on the options available for a safe pregnancy, birth and transition to motherhood, and can be viewed <u>here</u>.

Whilst we wish the need did not exist we are nonetheless proud supporters of the Canberra Women's SleepBus, an initiative of the National Council of Women (NCW) ACT. Launched in June 2021, the 22-bed pink SleepBus provides emergency overnight accommodation for homeless women and children.

At this, the conclusion of my fourth and final year as President, I would like to thank and acknowledge all of my Board colleagues for their individual and combined contributions this year, and for their humility and humanity.

- Vice-President and Chair of the Public Relations Committee, Gia Metherell, for her pragmatism, invaluable personal support and the many and varied Board contributions.
- Treasurer and Chair of the Finance Committee, Maria Edwards, for her continuing professional management and monitoring of finances and related matters this year.
- Long-standing Public Officer and chair of the Program Development Committee, Lynne Johnson, for her tireless support and enthusiasm for the board and committees, particularly the WSU webinar and hosted event.
- Philippa Lynch for her preparedness to don the "Black Hat" of governance and compliance, and for her leadership in relation to the Mary Kirk Fellowship.
- Kathy Metallinos for her commitment to contract compliance and reporting obligations, and as a valued member of the WSU working group
- Jane Smyth and Robby McGarvey for their thoughtful counsel at Board level and service on the Public Relations Committee.

Finally, I would like to thank and acknowledge Colleen Josifovski, CMS Business Manager, for providing invaluable corporate support and management, research and coordination of Board business.

I commend this Annual Report to you and look forward to CMS building on its legacy as we begin to deliver the 2021 – 26 Strategic Plan.

Treasurer's Report

The Canberra Mothercraft Society has now seen its first full financial year without ACT Government funding in decades, having wrapped up operations relating to QEII in the 2019-20 financial year.

This financial year resulted in an operating profit for the Canberra Mothercraft Society of \$116,643.

This profit is mostly attributed to unrealised gains on investments. The balances of investments in both the Community Development Fund and Scholarship Fund recovered following the fall last year and have continued to perform well this year.

The Society's expenditure included administrative costs and project costs, most notably the academic paper and live webinar by Professor Hannah Dahlen AM on the COAG Paper: Strategic Directions for Australian Maternity Services.

The balance of the Community Development Fund was \$303,685 at balance, with no expenditure from that fund during the year and an unrealised gain on investments of \$59,075. The CMS Scholarship Scheme continued to provide scholarships during the year, amounting to \$5,410, and \$681,506 was held for this purpose at balance date.

CMS's overall financial position remains stable with Accumulated Funds of \$2,067,572 at balance date.

A focus for the new financial year will be reviewing our investments to ensure a return that will sustain CMS and our efforts towards our mission long into the future.

The audited financial statements for the year, prepared by Kothes Chartered Accountants, are included in this annual report.

NOTES TO AND FORMING PART OF THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 JUNE 2021

1. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

The Society was formed in 1927 and is incorporated under the Associations Incorporation Act, 1991, ACT. It is registered with the Australian Business Register - Australian Business Number 27 358 139 470. The Society cancelled its registration for Goods & Services Tax during the year. The Society is registered as an income tax exempt charity and as a deductible gift recipient and is registered as a charity with the Australian Charities and Not-for-profits Commission.

This financial report is a special purpose financial report prepared in order to satisfy the financial reporting requirements of Division 60 of the *Australian Charities and Not-for-profits Commission Act 2012*. The Board has determined that the association is not a reporting entity.

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the notes to the financial statements and the following Australian Accounting Standards:

- AASB 101, Presentation of Financial Statements
- AASB 107, Statement of Cash Flows
- AASB 108, Accounting Policies, Changes in Accounting Estimates and Errors
- AASB 1048, Interpretation of Standards
- AASB 1054, Australian Additional Disclosures.

The financial report has been prepared on an accruals basis and is based on historic costs and does not take into account changing money values or, except where specifically stated, current valuations of non-current assets.

The following material accounting policies, which are consistent with the previous period unless otherwise stated, have been adopted in the preparation of this financial report.

(a) Income Tax

The Association is registered as an income tax exempt charity with the Australian Tax Office. Consequently, no provision for taxation has been made in the financial statements.

(b) Cash and Cash Equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents includes cash on hand, deposits held at call with financial institutions, other short term, highly liquid investments with original maturities of three months or less that are readily convertible to known amounts of cash and which are subject to an insignificant risk of changes in value, and bank overdrafts.

(c) Trade and Other Creditors

These amounts represent liabilities for goods and services provided to the economic entity prior to the end of the financial year and which are unpaid. The amounts are unsecured and are usually paid within 30 days of recognition.

(d) Investments

Investments are measured at fair value. Fair value is the market value of the investments as at the balance date.

NOTES TO AND FORMING PART OF THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 JUNE 2021

1. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies (continued)

(e) Revenue Recognition

The core principle of AASB 15 is that revenue is recognised on a basis that reflects the transfer of promised goods or services to customers at an amount that reflects the consideration the Association expects to receive in exchange for those goods or services. Revenue is recognised by applying a five step model as follows:

- 1. Identify the contract with the customer
- 2. Identify the performance obligations
- 3. Determine the transaction price
- 4. Allocate the transaction price to the performance obligations
- 5. Recognise revenue as and when control of the performance obligations is transferred

Generally the timing of the payment for sale of goods and rendering of services corresponds closely to the timing of satisfaction of the performance obligations, however where there is a difference, it will result in the recognition of a receivable, contract asset or contract liability. None of the revenue streams of the Association have any significant financing terms as there is less than 12 months between receipt of funds and satisfaction of performance obligations.

Opinion
